Look for drafts around existing weather stripping, the threshold and even around the locks, which may have gaps in them, as signs that your door needs to be resealed for the winter. "If a homeowner can see light at the perimeter or the bottom of the door, that's another sign that the door isn't weatherstripped properly or needs adjustment."



Watch for signs weather is taking its toll

If so, it may not be too late to save it. "The door is having an environmental response to the weather if the finish has gotten hazy or chalky or it's showing signs of surface cracks in the wood. We can usually salvage those doors by sanding them down and reapplying fresh primers and paints." If homeowners are concerned, they can call Memphis Door to simply come take a look without worrying about a hard sell, Salvaggio said. He prides himself on his company's honest approach to customer service.
